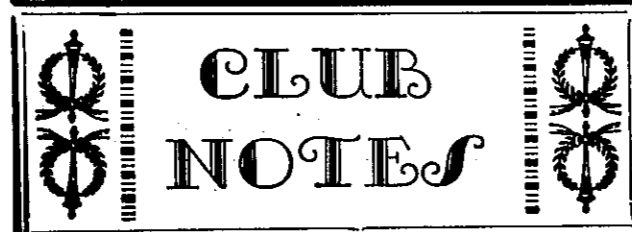

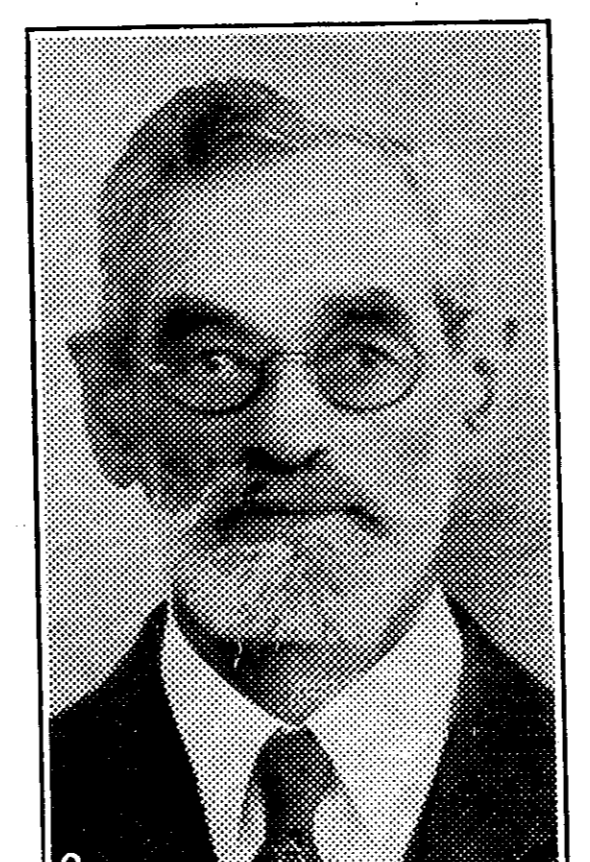
Names of Congress Delegates Must Be Registered May 5

The election of delegates to the Third General Assembly of the Canadian Jewish Congress will take place in Winnipeg on May 10, 1936. A copy of the rules and regulations governing election of delegates will be found in this issue.

The method of electing delegates to the Third Assembly of the Canadian Jewish Congress has been changed this year. There will be representation by various organizations. Every Jewish organization in Winnipeg entitled to representation must send in the names of their delegates to the Congress Electoral College to Ald. M. A. Gray, not later than May 5. The electors of the Electoral College will elect delegates to the Assembly of the Canadian Jewish Congress to be held at Montreal, May 30 and 31.

The Dominion Executive of the Canadian Jewish Congress announces that there will be a special "one cent per mile" fare for delegates from Winnipeg and Western Canada.

Eli Cherniack To Be Feted At Banquet Sunday

Fitting tribute to a man who has labored in the cause of Zionism and Jewish education and culture in Winnipeg for more than half a century will be paid Sunday, May 3, at a banquet at the Talmud Torah at 6.30 p.m., when citizens of the city will attend to honor Eli Cherniack. The event will also mark the 75th birthday anniversary of this beloved and ardent worker which he observed recently.

One of the few remaining pioneers who first started the Zionist movement in the city, a fearless leader who espoused the cause of Zionism when it was considered a heresy, and one of the living leaders who helped lay the foundation of the Talmud Torah, Mr. Cherniack has lived to see the realization of many of his dreams. At the founding of the Talmud Torah 25 years ago he fought valiantly for the inclusion of Hebrew on the curriculum and today draws much consolation from seeing the ancient language re-born and used as the official tongue of the people in Eretz Israel.

A large number of Winnipeg Jewry is expected to attend to pay tribute to Mr. Cherniack at the banquet Sunday. Tickets may be obtained from Dr. I. Ben Ezra, J. Weinsky and the Talmud Torah office.

Lord Tweedsmuir Lauds Zionism

"This is not a political occasion or I should not be here, for a Governor-General must keep away from politics. The Zionist cause is not a party policy; it is a solemn obligation of the British people, accepted by every party. The Balfour Declaration, and the Palestine Mandate based upon the Great War, including King Feisal, the representative of the Arab peoples. My interest in the matter dates a long way back, for I had many talks on the subject at the start with Lord Balfour, who was a close friend. He was a man who lived by the pure light of reason, and was not much given to emotional policies, but I think this matter appealed to his imagination and to his reason more than most political questions.

"What are the facts on which our Palestine policy is based? The first is that Palestine has never been a nation since it ceased to be Jewish. Its Arab peoples were never given a nation; they were only the scattered fringes of the great Arab race, whose home was in Arabia, and for centuries they were a disconsidered fragment of the Turkish Empire. The second fact is that it is desirable, in the interest not only of the Jewish race but of civilization, to provide for a Jewish national home.

"Gentlemen, to my mind the Jew is the natural bridge between the East and the West. If Palestine is to be a living and thriving community it can only be so by the influx of Jewish capital and Jewish brains, for the Jews are Orientals like the Arabs, and at the same time they are in the central tradition of Western culture. The prosperity of the old inhabitants, the Arabs, depends upon the prosperity of Palestine as a whole, and to this the newcomers have most nobly contributed. They have brought capital to the land, and that capital has not been provided by millionaires, but chiefly by the small subscriptions of the very poor.

"Zionism has never been more important than at this moment. We are witnessing what we believe to be one of the great tragedies of history. The wave of anti-Semitism which has broken over Northern Europe has created a second dispersion of the Jewish race. In these days, when most countries are jealously restricting their

immigration, Palestine is the one city of refuge left to the persecuted. Of course it cannot meet the whole problem. The number of Jews who can be admitted must depend rigidly upon Palestine's economic capacity to absorb them. But that there should be such a city of refuge, even though its capacity for reception is limited, gives beyond doubt a certain hope and comfort to the Jews in the darkest hour that they have known since Titus captured Jerusalem. The success of Zionism is no less important to Britain. Palestine holds the key to the strategic position on the great route between West and East. The war in Abyssinia has caused most of us to reflect upon the safe-guarding of that highroad. To have a strong and contented Palestine will, in the future, be of incalculable value to the British Empire.

"These are utilitarian arguments which I have given you, but there is another which must appeal to any man of imagination and humanity. The Jews have never forgotten Jerusalem, and till a few years ago their Holy Land has been only an inspiration and a dream. Now it is being made a reality. Perhaps this appeals specially to a Scotsman, for we Scots, like the Jews, have always been a far-wandering race, scattered over every part of the globe. But in our wanderings we have always had Scotland behind us, our mother country, the shrines of our sentiments and memories. Is it not right and fitting that the Jew, after long wanderings, should again find his homeland?

"I am proud to think that the record of my country towards your race has always been just and honorable, ever since the day when Oliver Cromwell permitted the Jews to return to England.

"I have long been a student of history, and there seems to me to be one lesson to be learned from the study of the past. Whatever nation has persecuted the people of Israel has sooner or later paid the penalty. Whatever nation has protected them has always won its reward. I confess that I am jealous that this great tradition of my country should be sustained and that the British Commonwealth should win the blessing of those who seek the peace and felicity of Jerusalem."

Young Jewish Students Capture Many Honors at Musical Festival

Jewish music students once again distinguished themselves at the Manitoba Regional Musical Festival held at the Auditorium during the past two weeks. Among the winners of various competitions are included:

Eight year old Maurice Cohen, son of Mr. and Mrs. Cohen, 952 Sherbrook street, pupil of Edith Levin. He won first place in a class of 65 entries in the Elementary pianoforte solo class. The test piece was "Cat's Paw" by Jessie Furze for which he received 165 marks.

Ruby Bregman, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. M. A. Bregman, won in the preparatory piano class. It was the largest competing group with 101 entries. She is a pupil of Margaret Prasow. Gordon Kushner received 158 marks in the pupil teachers' final piano solo competition.

Samuel Seetner received 170 marks to capture first place in the piano concerto (Concerto No. 4, D Minor, first movement by Rubenstein).

Pearl Soudack was awarded 86 marks in the piano forte solo, primary class to take first place.

Celia Chisick and Goldie Chess captured the pianoforte duet (preparatory) class with 166 marks, being two marks ahead of the other two finalists, Corinne Gordon and Sylvia Weiner. The test piece was "Stepping Stones" (Langford-Guest).

Ethel Kesselman with 77 was one mark ahead of Marguerite Barry in the intermediate pianoforte sight reading competition.

Shirley Trepel, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Eli Trepel was awarded 85 marks in the violinello competition Grade A.

Cecille Margolis received 167 marks in the preliminaries of the piano solo (intermediate) group.

Edith Simovitch was awarded 164 marks for a piano solo and Sibley Gussakov took 162 marks in Grade B piano solo.

Clinic Membership Campaign

As the requirements of the Clinic increased, so the calls upon the public were of necessity made more frequently. This year's executive, upon taking stock of the situation, are realizing that, although the need for funds is urgent, the public is being approached too often with minor money raising projects. Plans were therefore immediately formulated in an endeavor to discontinue all minor affairs, and to concentrate on one Membership Drive. The canvass is scheduled for May 15th to June 15th.
