YOU OUGHT TO KNOW THAT If we are to believe Edward J. Smythe, chairman of the National Committee Against Communism, one out of every 120 Americans is in receipt of some sort of anti-Semitic literature regularly. Smythe boasts that Fascism is on the march in this country. Fulvio Suvich, Il Duce's envoy in Washington, must be in a tight spot because of anti-Semitic agitation in the Italian press. Suvich is said to be a non-Aryan.

We don't know for sure, of course, but to judge from his name, Phillip Diamond of the University of Michigan, who together with Prof. Walter A. Reichart of that institution co-authored an essay included in a Jubilee volume issued in honor of the 75th birthday of Gerhard Hauptmann, most probably is a non-Aryan. suing the makers of the film 'The Black Legion' because the KKK's insignia was used without permission. Believe it or not the Patent Bureau actually granted a 14-year patent on the insignia, which doesn't expire until 1939.

In the heart of Gotham's garment center, where you can hear more Yiddish than English, an Irish peddler with a brogue a yard long hawks the Ten Commandments inscribed in Hebrew on a tiny plaque. You can find more than one minyan of Jewish actors any day at St. Malachy's Catholic church, where the Rialto's actors pause for meditation. The Salvation Army distributes kosher food to the Jewish poor for Rosh Hashonah and Passover. Subway riders using the station at 34th Street and Seventh Avenue wonder at the sign used by the Jewish halvah peddler who makes his headquarters there. It reads 'HCAE cl.' A couple of months ago he offered his wares at one cent EACH through a Yiddish sign. The sign indicates he has learned English but doesn't yet know that English is written from left to right. Among the honored guests among the first-nighters at New York's premiere of 'The Life of Zola' was Herman, the hat room attendant at the Cafe Royal, which is the Second Avenue hangout of the Yiddish intelligentsia.
