NEW FRENCH DREYFUS CASE QUASHED

Paris, (WNS) - The attempt of a military clique to prove treasonable conduct against Paul-Louis Weiller, French-Jewish aviator and substantial holder of stock in the French Air Mail Corporation, was frustrated through the efforts of police who discovered that the documents submitted by Weiller's accusers are false. Weiller is accused of conspiring to pass control of the French air interests to the German Luft Hansa. Some observers regarded the prosecution of the case as a 1932 version of the Dreyfus Affair.

JEWS WOULD USE BACK DOOR, PROF. GUMBEL FORECASTS

New York, (WNS) - If Adolf Hitler should come to power in Germany Jewish students and professors in the universities would be compelled to enter through the back door, Prof. Emil Gumbel, recently ousted as Professor of Political Economy at Heidelberg University by influence of the Nazis, predicted in an interview with the New York World-Telegram during his stay here at the International House, having just returned from the Sixth International Congress on Genetics at Cornell University.

Prof. Gumbel, a mild looking man, who revealed that he has a post at the University of Paris for the winter, in commenting upon the anti-Semitic tactics of the Hitlerites, said: "I am of Jewish descent, but I am more German. I can trace my ancestry in Germany back to the 17th century. You have seen photographs of Hitler and the others. Look at me. Do I not look the more Nordic? It is a joke and an evil one."

Remarking that Nazi students at Frankfurt and Berlin had tried but failed to force Jewish professors to use the rear entrance, Gumbel predicted that this demand would be

satisfied in all German universities if Hitler became Chancellor. "I have fought against what is now the Nazi party ever since the formation of the Republic. I have called them murderers. The Nazi party today is the same party, under a different name and with different goals, that murdered Finance Minister Erzberger in 1921 and Foreign Affairs Minister Rathenau in 1922. Also Liebknecht, the Socialist leader, in 1919."

SCHATZ REMAINS SHIPPED TO PALESTINE

New York, (WNS) - The remains of Prof. Boris Schatz, Palestine art pioneer, who died last March in Denver, where his body remained in a receiving vault, were placed on board the S. S. Excalibur for shipment to Palestine, after a public memorial service held at the Riverside Memorial Chapel here. The late etcher, sculptor and painter was characterized as "one of the most remarkable figures in modern Jewish history" by Morris Rothenberg, Zionist President. Other speakers included Louis Lipsky, Abraham Goldberg, David Pinski, Dr. Chaim Greenberg and Rabbi I. H. Levinthal. The funds for transportation of the body were supplied by the Zionist Organization and affiliated

groups. The expense was said to be in the neighborhood of \$1,200. The son, Dezalel, was not present at the services, though he knew of them. He is said to be in the Southwest.

HENRY FORD BOWS TO JEWS

New York, (WNS) - Henry Ford, Ford auto plutocrat, who was once internationally identified as an arch-enemy of the Jews, seems to think more highly of the virtues of the Jewish people in 1932. In the October issue of Pictorial Review, in an article on the economic situation of America, the auto king, bows to the good economic sense of Jews, remarking that their practices indicate how this country may emerge from depression.

"There is no sense in saving money," Henry Ford says. "I have always said that. There wouldn't be such a thing as being able to live off saved money in a right order of live. You can't save up health or work or happiness to use later, and money too is dead unless you use it."

"For the golden rule with money, or anything else, is use it or lose it. The Jewish people are right in this matter. They make a lot of money and they spend a lot. It is a healthy conduct and keeps money and life in circulation."
