RACHEL JANAIT CHAPTER NEWS

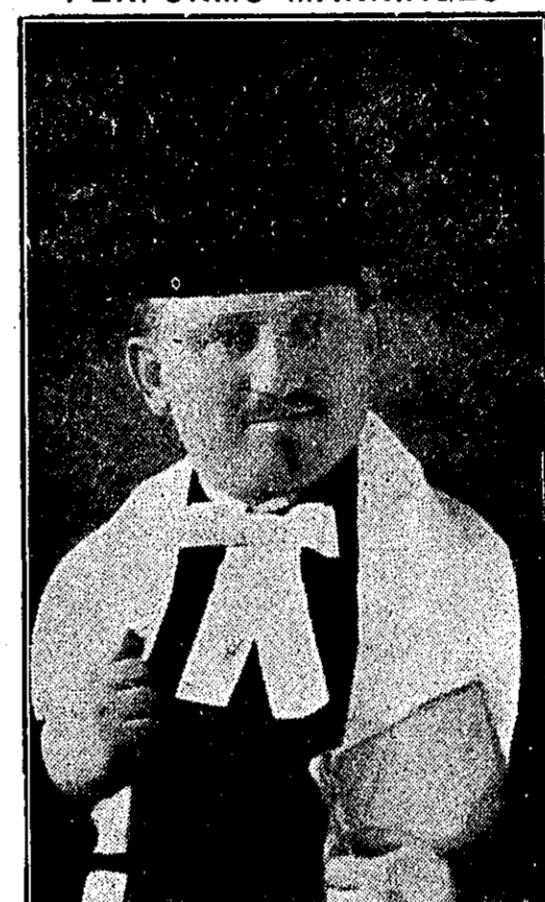
