Ald. Sidney L. Buckwold Re-Elected in Saskatoon

Saskatoon (Special) — Polling one of the heaviest votes in the Saskatoon civic elections, Ald Sidney L. Buckwold was re-elected to a second term on the city council. In Humboldt, Sask., Mayor B. T. Laskin was re-elected to a sixth term, defeating his only opponent by 690 to 574 in the heaviest voting in the town's history.

Ald. Buckwold, prominent local Jewish community leader and a national vice-president of the Zionist Organization of Canada, came within 35 votes of topping the aldermanic vote. He received 13,521 out of a total of 19,778 ballots cast.

Jewish candidates were also elected in North Battleford and Wynyard Saskatchewan municipal elections.

In North Battleford, Maurice Hoek was elected to city council with 1,238 votes, running second of three elected and only 32 behind the leading candidate.

Mrs. E. Blake Named To Saskatoon Meeting

Saskatoon — Mrs. E. Blake, of Saskatoon, is an accredited delegate of the local and provincial executive

to the convention of the Saskatchewan Liberal association slated for Nov. 25-27 in Saskatoon.

The convention has been called to select a provincial Liberal leader, and Mrs. Blake is the only Saskatchewan Jewish woman to be officially accredited.

U.S. GROUP BACKS LEMON PLANTINGS IN ISRAEL

Tel Aviv — A plan for planting lemon trees over large areas of Israel by American Jews interested in the citrus industry is being discussed by a number of United States investors, it was recently reported.

Irving Swartzberg, director of the American Real Lemon Company, has stated that the planting of lemon trees in Israel will add an important agricultural export item to this country. Mr. Swartzberg is co-operating with a representative of the Rassco Company in Chicago, Mr. Shadmon, in an effort to organize a group of investors among persons interested in the citrus industry in order to carry the plan into effect.

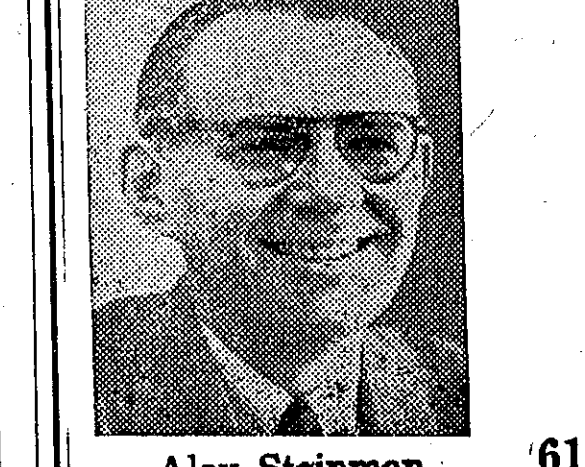

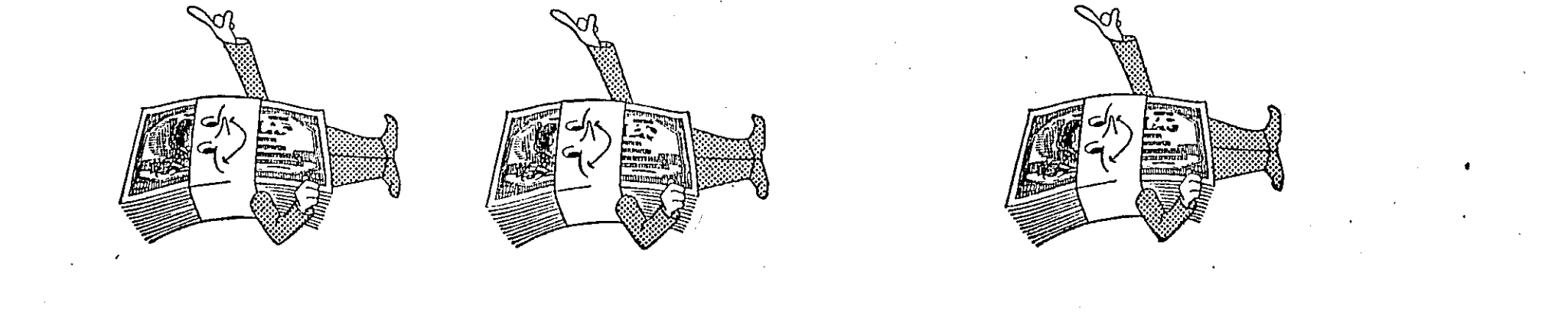
