On the eve of his trip overseas to spend ten days filming the new immigration into Israel and tape-recording interviews with them, J. I. Glesby, United Jewish Appeal chairman, spent a busy day for the campaign Sunday. He delivered a rousing appeal at the Canadian Jewish Congress Council-sponsored conference Sunday, urging generous increases in every level of UJA giving.

His appeal was seconded by that of guest speaker Monroe Abbey, chairman of the Canadian Jewish Congress national executive, who reviewed the scope of Congress activities, locally, nationally and overseas; supported through UJA funds.

Congress had processed \$18,000,000 in claims paid to victims of Nazism now residing in Canada. A grand total of close to five billion dollars will ultimately be paid by Germany and Austria for all types of personal claims and reparations to Israel covering the crimes of Nazism against the Jewish people. Congress' role in handling post-war immigration into Canada, was recently covered in a Maclean's Magazine story on the war orphans, and Mr. Abbey cited the tribute accorded Congress in this article.

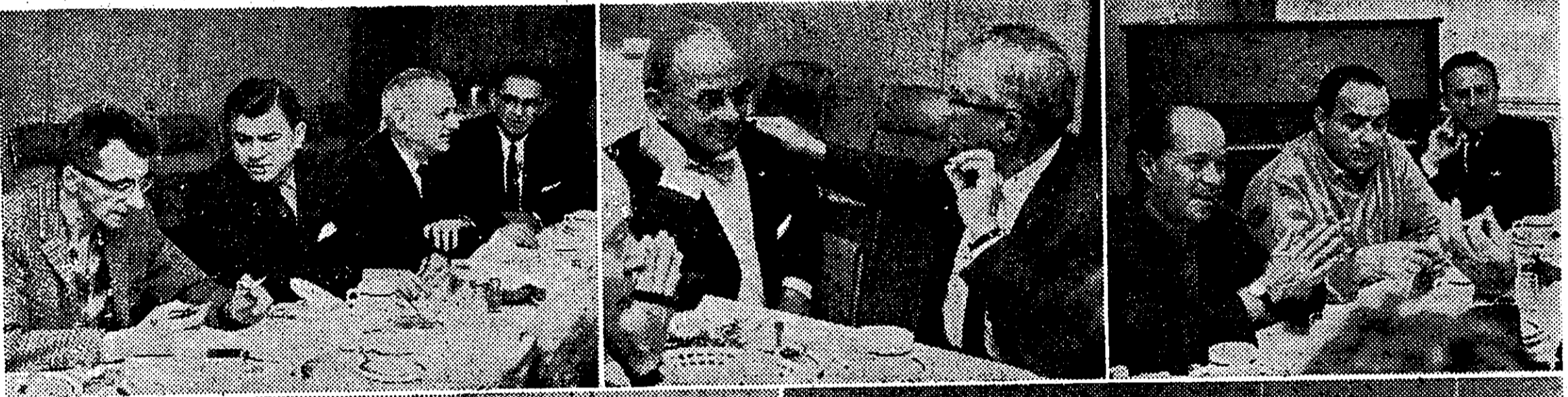
Re-Elected to Tax Foundation

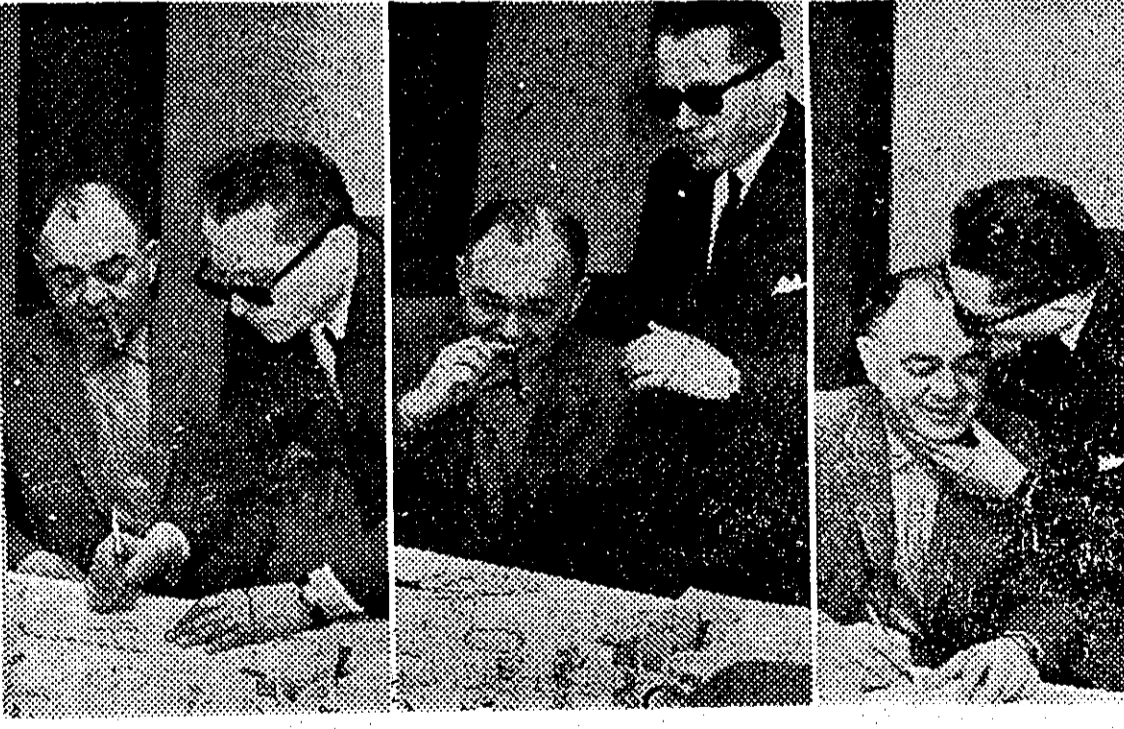

'Ike' Shores-Up Workers

With the impetus of two successful campaign dinners, and a calendar crowded with UJA workers' rallies, J. I. Glesby set out Monday on a brief visit to Israel to "re-charge his UJA batteries" as he explained it Sunday morning to a UJA workers' rally.

The recent 'I Like Ike' dinner staged by his Zionist associates had maintained a 40 per cent increase... the special gifts dinner addressed by world chairman of the Jewish Agency Moshe Sharett, had attained a minimum 25 per cent rate of increase.

"We are not taking any less," he told the canvassers. "There will be no discrimination. We cannot accept less than 25 per cent because if we do, we will fail to attain that extra \$160,000 we are committed to raise."

Mr. Glesby was referring to the \$160,000 differential between the \$640,000 raised in 1961 and the \$800,000 needed in 1962. It was a hard-working meeting with the chairman and his aides carefully processing the personal contribution of each of the workers present... before the card distribution got underway.

Last Monday night, the Peoples Division of the Canadian Jewish Congress held a workers' rally. Chaim Weizmann Club held a workers' rally last week, where minimum increases averaged 25 per cent in cards signed at the meeting.
