WEST RUSHES EGYPT'S AID

Paris (JTA) — With the Algerian problem on the way to solution, France was scheduled to begin talks soon with Egyptian diplomats for renewal of diplomatic ties. President Nasser hopes to induce the French to end their close and friendly ties with Israel but most French experts doubt this will happen.

"Al Goumhuriya," Nasser's official newspaper, said flatly in an editorial that the principal condition for such resumed Franco-Egyptian ties, broken off in the 1956 Sinai campaign, would be the breaking off by France of its close ties with Israel.

The newspaper presented a list of problems "which must be settled" before diplomatic relations could be resumed. One was the "continuous influx of French arms for Israel which are used against the rights of the people of Palestine and against the Arabs. Another was the attitude of France toward arrangement of a special agreement linking Israel with the European Common Market, thus opening to Israel the main gate to enable it to accede to Africa's markets."

The Western Powers are now thought to consider that Nasser has reached a stage of disillusionment with the Soviet Union. The Kennedy administration is said to be of the opinion that the United States and its allies can work with Nasser to constructive ends.

Can-Am Investments on Rise
New York (JTA) — Business investments in Israel by American and Canadian firms are expected to reach a new high in 1962 of \$120,000,000, Israel's Economic Minister to the United States and Canada, Aryeh Manor, said here last week in an address before the international division of the American Management Association. United States and Canadian investment in Israel in 1960 reached \$76,000,000. In 1961, investment increased to \$94,000,000. Mr. Manor reported that "more than 200 American firms now have business investments in Israel. He credited the continuing rise in American investments to two factors. The first is Israel's 1951 Law for the Encouragement of

Capital Investments, which, he said, offers investors many benefits, including the rights of withdrawal of 100 per cent of profit and capital in dollars, as well as highly attractive tax benefits and incentives." The second factor was the establishment in 1960 of the Government of Israel Investment Authority for North America, which has offices in nine major cities throughout the United States.

Meanwhile a foreign Office spokesman denied reports that Britain would be part of the consortium allegedly made up of the U.S.A., Germany and Italy, with the International Monetary Fund. "We are unlikely to have money to spare for such a purpose," he said.

Rabbi Charges Detroit Bishop
Tel Aviv (JTA) — Chief Rabbi Moses Rosen of Rumania submitted last week to the Israeli press pictures and documents which he said showed that Bishop Vioral Trifu, now of Detroit, was the former head of the Rumanian Green Shirt student organization of the Rumanian Iron Guard which conducted pogroms on Jews under the Antonescu Regime.

The Chief Rabbi explained he had delayed his return to Rumania because he had been looking for those documents. He said he was prepared to appear before any board to testify against Trifu. Rabbi Rosen said he found the documentary material in the archives of the Yad Vashem, the official agency for the documentation of the Nazi genocide program in Europe, and of the World Jewish Congress.

Dr. Aryeh Tartakower, of the Israeli World Jewish Congress executive, said his organization would not take any position as to which Jewish organization would seek to press charges in the case but all material has been transferred to the American Jewish Congress in New York City for action.

'Babi Yar' Poet Faces Press

London (JCN) — Russia's leading literary rebel, Yevgeni Yevtushenko, faced a host of British and foreign journalists here and tried to play down the political significance of his own most celebrated poem "Babi Yar" which condemned anti-Semitism both in the old and the new Russia. "This poem has been given in the West a meaning which I have never intended," the 29-year-old poet stated.

It was this poem, which derived its name (Babi Yar) from the ravine near Kiev where some 130,000 Jews were murdered in 1941 by the Germans, that made Yevtushenko's name famous beyond the frontiers of the Soviet Union, but also brought upon him inside it a series of venomous attacks by the reactionary die-hards of the Stalinist era. These attacks were published in the journal of the Ministry of Culture "Literatura i Zhizn," (Life and Literature) while his poem had originally appeared in "Literaturnaya Gazeta," organ of the Soviet Writers' Union.

Asked what caused him to write the poem 18 years after the tragic events of Babi Yar and what was the impact it made on the younger generation of Russia, Yevtushenko said that writers had many a time made events of the distant past the subject of artistic creation.

Still talking about anti-Semitism as if it were only a thing of the past, Yevtushenko continued: "My aim was to demonstrate that anti-Semitism has no relation to the true spirit of the Russian people. I wanted to say that anti-Semites who once called themselves Soyuz Russkovo Maroda (the Union of Russian People) a pogromist organization in Tsarist Russia, were never the representatives of the Russian people. No one who is a chauvinistic nationalist can truly represent the people of Russia."

World News in Brief Jerusalem

An Israeli magistrate recently questioned Adolf Eichmann in his cell on behalf of Austrian and Yugoslav Courts about information required about former Nazis. One man in question is believed to be Andre Artukovic whose extradition was requested from the United States where he is living. The American Government has refused to extradite him. The other is Doctor Ernest Rajakowitch who was a member of Eichmann's department and about whom the Austrians want information. Eichmann has refused to give any information pending decision on his appeal.

Kiamasha Lake, N.Y.

The men in the American Jewish community are "relinquishing more and more of their communal responsibilities to the women," the National Federation of Jewish Men's Clubs was warned here this week at its 33rd annual convention. Rabbi Joel S. Geffen, spiritual advisor to the Federation, told the convention that "while our women deserve commendation for the services they offer the Jewish community, it is essential that the men reverse the trend of diminishing male leadership in the spiritual and communal spheres of our community life."

New York

Jewish community campaigns continue to report impressive increases in all giving categories to maintain a pace 20 per cent ahead of 1961 on the same gifts, according to analyses of campaign progress at the 60 per cent mark of last year's totals issued here this week by the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds. The report, made public by Jewish Federations of Toronto, chairman of the Council's campaign committee, covered results in 74 large, middle-size and small cities — not including New York City — which raised more than \$58,000,000 in 1961.

Samuel H. Daroff, president of the American Jewish League for Israel, declared this week that "the time demand for a central, single Zionist organization in the United States, an organization freed of the strictures and limitations imposed by party-thinking and party-structure." Asserting that the Zionist movement would, "for many decades to come, have to face and contend with many as yet unfulfilled tasks," he added that "the fulfillment of those tasks" was being hampered by "a feature of Zionism which has now outlived its use, and by its retention, merely serves as an obstruction to the effective execution of our obligations."

Phoenix, Ariz.

Peggy Goldwater, 17-year-old daughter of United States Senator Barry Goldwater, has confirmed reports she hoped to go to Israel and live on a kibbutz after she finishes junior college. She is completing high school requirements at the exclusive Judson school here. Her father, the leading conservative in the Republican party, is present head of the Goldwater family. The Goldwaters have been prominent merchants in the Western United States for three generations. The family is Jewish, but Senator Goldwater was raised as an Episcopalian.

Washington

President Kennedy commended the 119-year-record of B'nai B'rith community services as "a positive constructive force for a good part of the history" of the U.S.A. The President's tribute was contained in a letter to B'nai B'rith President Label Katz, in which the President also extended greetings to the B'nai B'rith triennial convention which will open here May 12 for five days. Some 1,200 guests and delegates from 35 states as well as from Canada, Latin America, Great Britain, Ireland, Continental Europe and Israel are expected for the convention. Winnipeg delegates are Laurie Mainster and Sidney J. Spivak.
