Daniel Fenson, 72, of New York, passed away suddenly in Winnipeg

Saturday, July 23, while visiting with his family here. Born in Poland, he had lived in Winnipeg from 1914 to 1917 before settling in New York. During those years he was active in the Maccabean Club, an early Zionist group in Winnipeg. Later he established a short-lived Anglo-Jewish weekly, the American Israelite, in New York.

He was a member of the Kingsbridge Heights Jewish Centre in the Bronx, New York, a member of Jewish social organizations, and actively followed Jewish musical and cultural life in New York.

Surviving are his widow, Anne; a son, Melvin, in Winnipeg; a daughter, Mrs. Margie Lippman, in Yonkers, N.Y.; six grandchildren and two sisters in Winnipeg, Mrs. Laura Moser and Mrs. Ruth Prosen.

Funeral services were held in New York at the Riverside Chapel, Bronx, with Rabbi Israel Miller officiating. Interment was in Westchester Jewish Cemetery.

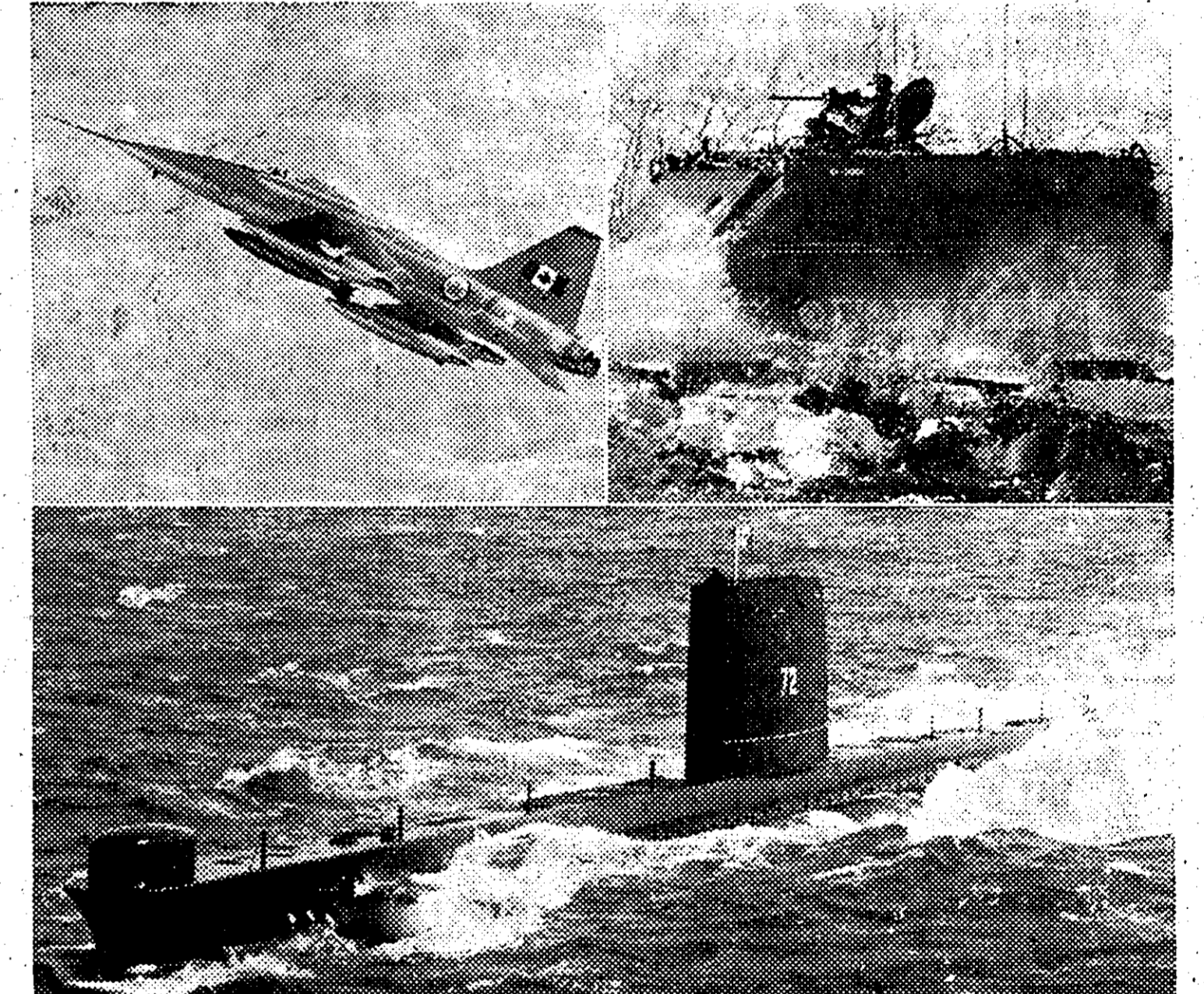
