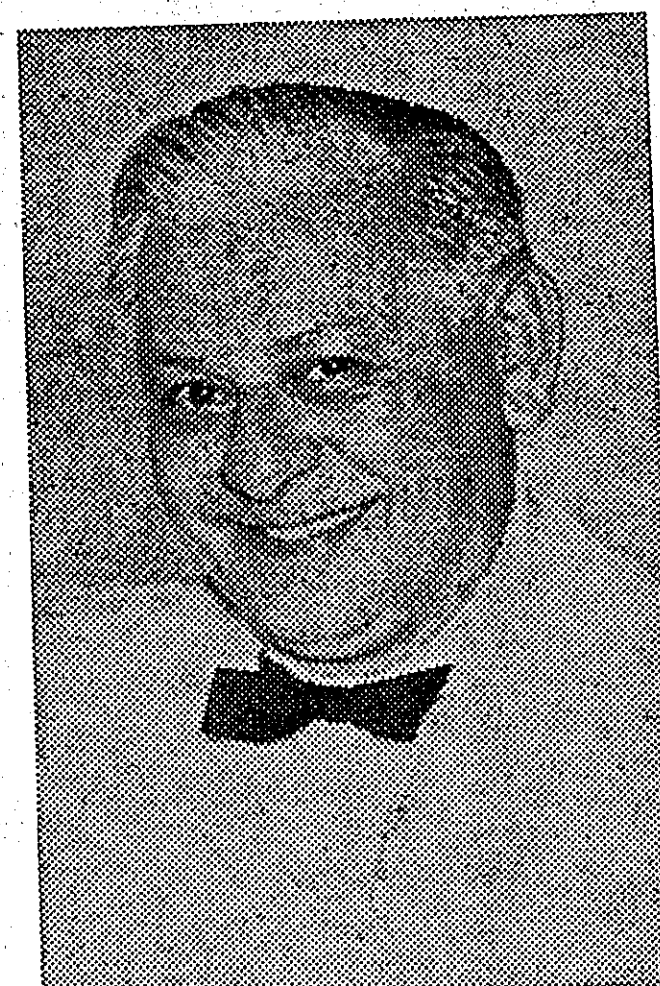

80,000 civilian volunteers have
brought the group to more than
1,000,000. They include bearded
Moslem priests, veiled women and
young girls, Boy Scouts and mem-
bers of other organizations.

U.S. Applicants Reported
Applications have come from
Greece, Italy, Yugoslavia, Iran,
Pakistan, the Sudan, the Gold Coast,
India, Indonesia, Ceylon, Communist
China and all Arab countries.

It added that "offers also had been
received from North and South
America."
"President Gamal Abdel Nasser
has received from the United States
some telegrams in which the send-
ers volunteer to join the Egyptian
Army," it was said.

It was difficult to estimate here to
what extent these reports were
genuine and how much they were
involved in Egypt's massive propa-
ganda campaign. It could not be
determined also whether reports of
the size of the new Liberation Army
were exaggerated.

There was no doubt, however,
that President Nasser had formed

a potential nation-wide guerrilla
force in cities and villages along
the Nile and along the Suez Canal.
Youth groups, priests and women
have been seen drilling and train-
ing in the use of newly issued rifles,
submachine guns, grenades and
other light weapons.

President Nasser has said the
entire population would be armed
and put into the fight if the British
and French attempted to wrest con-
trol of the canal from him by force.

END OF ISRAEL BLOCKADE SEEN PART OF WEST PLAN

LONDON (JTA) — Observers
here awaiting the next develop-
ments in the Suez Canal situation
following conclusion of the 22-
nation conference expressed belief
today that lifting of the Egyptian
blockade of Israel shipping is an
integral part of the majority plan
which the five-man committee re-
presenting the parley is to submit
to Egyptian President Nasser. The
majority plan, it is pointed out,
not only reiterates the principle
of the Constantinople Convention
of 1888, but also stresses the prin-
ciple of "insulating the operation
of the Canal from the influence
of the politics of any nation."

Observers of the conference said
today that the Western case, pre-
sented in the universal interest of
all maritime nations, would be
severely damaged if it did not cite
the blockade as a blatant abuse
of the international waterway by
Egypt. Increasing recognition is
being given here to the fact that
no revision of the Canal regime
can endure unless this precedent
is removed.

Observers here feel that the con-
ference strongly reaffirmed the
principle of unimpeded navigation
without discrimination of flag. The
attitude of various delegates sug-
gested they had become increas-
ingly conscious of the blockade
problem as part and parcel of the
general issue.

BG HITS EDEN ON SUEZ CRISIS

Tel Aviv (JTA)—More than 1,200
delegates, representing 90,000 mem-
bers of the Mafai Party, dominant
element in the Israel Government
coalition, began intensive debate in
their national convention this week
to ensure that there will not be a
second, third or fourth round, al-
though we are certain of victory if
a second round comes."
He said that Israel must make
every effort to preserve peace. "All

WASHINGTON (JTA)—Israeli circles noted today with sat-
isfaction the remarks of U.S. Secretary of State John Foster Dulles on
views expressed at the London Suez parley wherein Dulles referred
to the Egyptian "defiance" of United Nations resolutions as well as
the 1888 Constantinople Convention concerning free Suez passage;
the latter including the clause that the Canal be open to all ships
"without distinction of flag."

JERUSALEM (JTA)—A special Cabinet meeting on the eight
day old bus strike which has paralyzed countrywide transport, author-
ized the Minister of Communications to operate public transport if
necessary.

JERUSALEM (JTA)—Israel's current oil production of 70 tons
daily will expand to between 180 and 200 tons, according to Dr.
Menaheem Bader, director-general of the Ministry of Development.
Six wells in the Heletz area are in production now, and more soon
will be drilled. The Technion at Haifa today established a new
department to teach oilfield technology.

JERUSALEM (JTA)—Monsignor Garail, personal representative
of 96-year-old Cardinal Salgue, Archbishop of Toulouse, is visiting
Israel to inspect the French section of the "Forest of Martyrs" planted
by veterans of the French anti-Nazi underground, and named after
the Cardinal. The latter saved many thousands of Jews, including
children, in his area during the Nazi occupation.

Author, Flyer, French 'Cercle' President, Here for Congress

M. H. Myerson, Q.C., of Montreal,
prominent representative of the
Canadian Jewish Congress, the
author of "Germany's War Crimes
and Punishment," will address the
Winnipeg Congress Conference on
Sunday, Sept. 9, at Peretz hall, 418
Aberdeen Avenue. The conference
will review local and national Jew-
ish problem to be dealt with at the
11th Plenary Session of the Cana-
dian Jewish Congress.

Representatives of all organiza-
tions are urged to attend both ses-
sions.
The first session, opening at 9.30
a.m., will highlight reports and dis-
cussion to be followed by luncheon
when M. Myerson will extend greet-
ings from the national executive of
the Congress.

The second session, at 2.30 p.m.,
will feature in a report on the ac-
tivities of the Canadian Jewish Con-
gress on a national level with par-
ticular emphasis on education pro-
grams promoted by Congress.

Soviets Pledge Hebrew Instruction in Schools

Stockholm (JTA)—A high Soviet
official has pledged in writing that
the Hebrew language would be
taught to children in the Soviet
schools whenever ten parents re-
quest such instruction. Prof. Abra-
ham I. Katsh, chairman of the De-
partment of Hebrew Culture and
Education at New York University,
declared here this week.

Dr. Katsh stopped here en route
from a nine-day visit to the
Soviet Union.
